ELEMENTS OF COMMUNION

Our goal is to provide elements for communion that all are able to consume. It is an act of hospitality mirrored in God’s hospitality inviting us to the table. The bread we are offering at today’s communion is labeled by the manufacturer as gluten, nut, egg, and dairy free, and includes the following ingredients: water, sour dough (rice flour, water), rice starch, cornstarch, sugars (rice syrup, caramelized sugar), modified cellulose, psyllium seed husk (vegetable fibre), sunflower oil, pea protein, yeast, millet flour, citrus fibre, rice flour, quinoa flour, salt, guar gum, corn flour. May Contain: Mustard, Sesame.

From the Pews, Tim Reed

Today’s scripture account of Jesus feeding the five thousand (Matthew 14:13–21) speaks with surprising relevance to our world today. We live in a time marked by wars, political division, economic uncertainty, natural disasters, and widespread loneliness. News headlines often emphasize scarcity — limited resources, shrinking trust, and growing fear. In this setting, Jesus offers a radically different perspective.

The disciples looked at the crowd and saw an impossible problem. Their practical solution was to send everyone away to fend for themselves. Jesus, however, first saw people in need. Scripture tells us that “he had compassion on them.” Before addressing their hunger, he healed their sick, demonstrating that God’s concern extends to every dimension of human life. Compassion, not convenience, became the starting point for his response.

Jesus then challenged his disciples with the words, “You give them something to eat.” Their immediate focus was on what they lacked: only five loaves and two fish. It is easy for me to respond the same way when confronted with overwhelming challenges. I may believe that my individual effort is too small to matter against problems such as poverty, homelessness, addiction, refugee crises, or fractured communities. Yet Jesus teaches that God often begins his greatest works with ordinary people who willingly offer what little they have.

The miracle also reminds me that gratitude precedes abundance. Before multiplying the food, Jesus gave thanks. In a culture that often emphasizes dissatisfaction and comparison, thanksgiving reorients our hearts to recognize God’s provision and opens us to become channels of his generosity.

Perhaps the most remarkable detail is that everyone ate until they were satisfied, and twelve baskets remained. God’s kingdom is not defined by scarcity but by overflowing grace. While human systems frequently compete over limited resources, Christ demonstrates that generosity can multiply hope, strengthen communities, and inspire others to give.

As Christians navigate today’s complex world, this passage invites us to replace fear with faith, indifference with compassion, and scarcity thinking with generous living. We may not solve every global crisis, but when we place our gifts, talents, and resources into Christ’s hands, he can use them far beyond what we imagine. The miracle of the five thousand reminds us that God still accomplishes extraordinary things through ordinary acts of faithful obedience.

Though rightly viewed as a meal of remembrance, the Lord's Supper is also an occasion of anticipation. This text draws on abundant biblical imagery to evoke the fulfillment of Jesus' promise to share the feast anew "in the kingdom of God" (Matthew 26:29/Mark 14:25/Luke 22:16).
