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From the Pews, Brooke Culclasure

As I was pondering the topic of this reflection, I looked at the date and realized we were getting ready to move into September. As I tend to do when the month of September rolls around, my mind goes to the September 11th terrorist attacks and I do some quick math to remind myself of how long it's been since that terrible day. After I did the math this time, even though I know I must have read or heard on the news about the 25th anniversary, I was incredulous and it hit hard to realize that's it been a quarter of a century since that day.

I was seven months pregnant with my second son on that day, working at a college in Lynchburg, Virginia while my one-year-old son was cared for by my sister. The news quickly filtered down to the Dean of Students Offices and we were soon inundated with students who had no other place to go and needed a place to help process what was happening, especially the handful of students with family members directly impacted. Even though I knew I needed to stay, part of me really just wanted to leave immediately and get my baby and hide away with my family. While I was not at the horrible scenes of the attacks, there were scary and overwhelming feelings of chaos among us all and the feeling that the world was out of control and falling apart. If I felt that way in Lynchburg, relatively far away from the tragedy, I can't even truly fathom how those felt in the middle of everything.

Moving to our scripture this week—Psalm 46 and its promise that God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in times of chaos or trouble. When I hear Psalm 46 in this context, it is honestly difficult to think about and fully consider. As I have read and heard from testimonials of both survivors of the attacks and family members of those who were lost, there certainly was and is still solace in faith (faith of all types) and that faith gave people strength both in the face of death or dealing with the loss of a loved one. But still...this is always hard for me to wrap my head around when I think about the scale of the 9-11 tragedy. I can understand why some might have thought God was not there for them that day.

Similar thoughts sometimes come to me in present day when I see large-scale tragedies such as the war in Ukraine and the very recent floods in Nepal. I still have to work through trying to understand. But I do truly know the promise of Psalm 46 is still there, even if it's hard to see...and that when the things become uncertain or difficult or chaotic, God remains and is still there.
